Community

The town of Cohasset is located on the shore of Massachusetts Bay about twenty miles southeast of Boston. Its population for the year 2017, as provided by its Board of Registrars, is 8,018. Twenty-five percent of the population is 60 years of age or older and 19% is under 18. The average family income is above the national average.

Cohasset Village, located on and just inland from Cohasset Harbor—the location of the town's lobstering fleet, recreational craft and boating clubs—contains a small commercial area and a beautiful elongated Common. The church buildings overlook both from the tall rock outcropping on which they are built. The Common is the site of a farmer's market every Thursday from June to October. The Town's more important commerce is strung out along Route 3A, which runs the northsouth length of the town a half mile or so west of the Village. Cohasset is connected to Boston, to which a significant fraction of its working population commutes, by highway, commuter rail and, in neighboring Hingham, commuter boat.

The town is served by five churches: the Episcopal, Congregational and Unitarian-Universalist churches clustered on and around the Common; the Roman Catholic Church on South Main Street; and the South Shore Hellenic Orthodox Church in the "West Corner," where Cohasset joins Hingham and Hull. There is also a Vedanta Center off of Norman Todd Road. None of the other main-line Protestant denominations have churches in Cohasset.

Most of the town's school-age children attend its small but highly ranked public schools. There are two well attended, affordable non-profit pre-schools on the Common.

A public library with interesting free day and evening programs affords its cardholders access to the collections of most of the other public libraries on the South Shore. The Cohasset Historical Society houses pertinent local collections, presents programs on historical subjects, and maintains two nearby eighteenth-century buildings as small museums.

There are a number of children's sports programs, including soccer and Little League baseball, as well as other recreational opportunities promoted by the Town's Recreation Department. Children as young as eight have the chance to learn to sail at the Cohasset Sailing Club. Public and private sailing and rowing clubs exist for adults as well. For the athletically inclined of all ages there is, pre-eminently, Sandy Beach and the public swimming pool, a golf club, two indoor tennis clubs and several physical fitness workout facilities. For joggers, bikers and dog walkers there are numerous scenic roads and paths, including the extensive trails in Whitney Woods, Wheelwright Park and the White Woods of Holly Hill, an educational organic farm.

From a social service point of view, one of the Town's most important agencies is perhaps the Senior Center, located in the recently constructed Willcutt Commons building off of Sohier Street. A food pantry located in the basement of the catholic rectory is widely supported by the whole community. Safe Harbor Cohasset, a recently established organization with a mission to encourage healthy, educated and responsible choices about drug and alcohol use, is very active in the community.

St. Stephen's also serves the town of Hull, which contains no Episcopal church but is the home of many of St. Stephen's most active members. Hull is also the site of Wellspring, our area's most significant social service agency, offering a food pantry, thrift shop and extensive remedial educational and training services.





Church History

Summer residents founded St. Stephen's parish in 1896. Although summer parishes were once common throughout New England, St. Stephen's never fell into such a category. The parish included enough year round residents—local merchants, farmers and fishermen—to keep the services going year-round. The church building, designed by Cram and Goodhue, was completed and dedicated in 1901.

After a succession of short-term pastors in the first eight years, some of whom went on to illustrious careers, the parish enjoyed two rectors with extended tenure. The Rev. Howard Key Bartow served 17 years (1904-1921), and was followed by the Rev. Charles Chase Wilson, who served thirty years (1921-1951). These two rectors were largely responsible for establishing St. Stephen's within the Cohasset community. The Rev. Bartow arranged for the completion of the church tower in 1907 and expanded the outreach of the church to the greater community by establishing Bonnie Bairns, a summer camp for sick babies and children from Boston. This program continued until 1946, when the services were integrated with others in the Boston area. The Rev. Charles Chase Wilson continued the outreach to the greater community, bringing together summer and year-round residents through his inclusive approach to ministry. During his tenure he oversaw the installation of a carillon given by Mrs. Hugh Bancroft as a memorial to her mother Mrs. Clarence E. Barron, wife of the financial publisher. She added more bells gradually for a total of fifty-one, finally completing the project in 1928. Later in the 1960 renovation of the church, Jane Cook and Jessie Cox gave a magnificent organ in memory of their mother Mrs. Hugh Bancroft, as well as a trust to maintain these wonderful musical gifts. This family's effort helped to build our strong music program. The church has benefitted greatly from its partnership with the laity.

During the 66 years since the tenure of Rev. Wilson, there have been five rectors: the Rev. Bradford Tite (1951-1959), the Rev. F. Lee Richards (1960-1970), the Rev. Richard D. Muir (1970-1984), the Rev. E. Clifford Cutler (1985-2008), and the Rev. Margot Critchfield

Tite guided the construction of the new Charles Chase Wilson Parish House, the Rev. Richards oversaw the renovation of the church, the Rev. Cutler initiated an addition for better handicapped accessibility as well a memorial garden, and the Rev. Critchfield reinstituted the beloved summer beach service. Over this time our ministry has grown more innovative and our parish more inclusive.

Church Facilities

St. Stephen's neo-Gothic building and carillon bell tower are a dominant and central feature of historic Cohasset village. The original building was completed in 1901. Renovations to to the Old Parish House were completed in 1933 and the New Parish House was added in 1955.

The carillon was renovated in 1989 and brought to "concert pitch" with 57 bells, making it the largest carillon by bell count in New England. Our carillon is one of the few in the world with a range sufficient to permit the performance of every piece of music composed for the carillon. St. Stephen's has the oldest continuing annual carillon recital series in the country.

The interior of the church is richly appointed with carved oak paneling, pews and millwork. There are ten stained glass windows given in memoriam, the last as recently as 2001. Seating capacity is 208, more with supplemental chairs. The Aeolian-Skinner pipe organ was installed in 1964 during a prior renovation of the church. Adjacent to the sanctuary, the Old Parish House has several offices, a youth classroom, the Bride's Room and the choir room.

In the New Parish House completed in 1957, there are seven classrooms for educational and meeting purposes and four offices for clergy and staff. Walton Rogers Hall facilitates large social gatherings and other functions. It





is equipped with a stage and a commercial kitchen. An elevator and memorial garden were completed in 2006 by the architectural firm of Strekalovsky and Hoit. Great care was taken to obtain seam-faced granite from the same Weymouth quarry from which the granite for the church came. The memorial garden is beautifully landscaped and a lovely place to pray, rest and meditate.

The Rectory is a four-bedroom home situated on a quarter-acre lot located approximately 100 yards from the church and adjacent to town conservation land. Originally a carriage house, the home was constructed over 100 years ago. Maintaining the Rectory is part of the annual parish budget. It has many fine period architectural details, including a curved staircase, fireplaces, a curved wall in the dinning room, and built-in shelves in the living room and pantry.

Church Programs

Fellowship

Fellowship is an important ministry at St. Stephen's. Whether it is donuts after the summer beach services or the regular coffee hour after the ten o'clock church service on Sunday, these are important opportunities to welcome new people and to catch up with old friends. Fellowship activities occur throughout the church program year, starting in September with the Ice Cream Sundae Sunday celebration and ending in August with the Carillon Concerts.

Outreach

Our outreach ministries strive to reach across boundaries of race, class, lifestyle, language and location. St. Stephen's outreach programs are involved with hunger, homelessness, poverty, prisons, education, AIDS and disaster relief. There are 17 outreach ministries that we support financially and in other ways, although we are always called to do more and involve more parish members. These comprise some close to home like the Cohasset Food Pantry, Cohasset Elders, Cooking for Father Bill's (a homeless shelter in Quincy), Bay Cove Human Services, Interfaith Social Services, B-Safe Summer Camp in Boston and others further afield like Nu-Day Syria, St. Boniface/Haiti, White Earth Reservation in Minnesota, Episcopal Relief and Partakers, a Prison Ministry.

In addition, we also serve spiritually within our own church community by providing Lay Eucharistic Ministers who take communion to the housebound, and an Intercessory Prayer group, who pray daily on behalf of those who have asked for prayers for themselves and others. A Christian Meditation group meets on a weekly basis.

Traditional and Seasonal Events

Special services are held throughout the church year to honor various Christian traditions, often tied to the Christian calendar and valued by our parishioners. Although not an exhaustive listing, these include:

- Blessing of the Animals on St. Francis Feast Day
- Halloween, All Souls and All Saints Services
- Cohasset Thanksgiving Ecumenical Service
- Christmas Program starting with an Advent Carol Service and ending at the Epiphany Pageant
- Lenten Services including Holy Week Morning Prayer
- Palm Sunday
- Maundy Thursday Supper and Service
- Good Friday All Night Vigil
- Two Easter Sunday Choral Services
- Pentecost with readings done in different languages





Music

Music plays a vital role in helping our parish find ever more ways to grow spiritually, and to serve God. We are thankful to have a talented and devoted Director of Music Ministries, whose important role in the church includes leading the choir, playing both the organ and carillon, and organizing our concert and carillon music series.

St. Stephen's choir is an all-volunteer, non-auditioned choir; anyone who shows up is welcome. The choir sings during the ten o'clock Sunday morning service, primarily using hymns from the 1982 Hymnal, as well as a variety of anthems. Special selections are performed for Advent Lessons & Carols, Palm Sunday and Easter.

The St. Stephen's concert series has been presenting concerts for the community at large for well over 25 years to serve as an outreach for the wider community to experience our church. Distinguished performers range from brass and string groups to choirs and organ recitals.

St. Stephen's carillon is a unique resource for the community, and the church sponsors a carillon concert series with carillonneurs from around the world on Sunday evenings in the summer. The audience can enjoy the carillon and a picnic on the Town Common or in the courtyard of the church.

Christian Education

All generations of our parish agree that a key mission of our church is to educate our youth, the future of our world, in the teachings and ways of Jesus Christ, Teacher and Shepherd. We are blessed to have the energies and talent of a Director of Children and Youth Ministries to organize and run our diverse and active Christian education programs.



Godly Play®

Godly Play® is a pathway of spiritual direction and discovery for children, modeled on the Montessori method and Christian worship. St. Stephen's has been offering this globally recognized program for children ages 3 years through 5th grade for nearly 20 years. Godly Play® has been very successful in engaging our children and teaching them the language of our faith; it also provides a spiritual outlet for our trained storytellers and classroom greeters. St. Stephen's Godly Play® classrooms are well resourced, both with materials and with highly trained, seasoned storytellers and is one of our most successful outreach endeavors, providing young families with exposure to our church community.





Youth Groups

The church has separate youth groups for middle school and high school students. The middle school youth group meets on a regular basis with a curriculum that varies based on the needs and interests of the participants. They often join the high school group for fellowship and community service activities. Our aim, and challenge, is to keep the youth engaged with the church throughout their middle and high school years.



Vacation Bible School

St. Stephen's is the only church in Cohasset providing a summer VBS program, serving children from Cohasset and neighboring towns. Starting in the spring, work parties prepare decorations, collect supplies and fundraise. VBS volunteers include many of our youth, who act as classroom assistants, crew leaders—even artists and actors! Each summer, the parish hall and surrounding classrooms are transformed into places of wonder, where children can been seen and heard singing and dancing throughout the day as they listen to Bible stories and learn about God's many gifts. This popular program is another important and successful way that the Church engages with young families in the community.



Confirmation and First Intentional Communion

Confirmation classes are offered every year and are open to teens and adults. These classes focus on the reaffirmation of the participant's Baptismal vows in the context of Episcopal doctrine, and on the application of their faith to how they live their daily lives. Confirmation classes culminate in a powerful service led by the Bishop, usually at the Cathedral in Boston, and includes all the other confirmation candidates of the South Shore Deanery.

St. Stephen's has also begun offering a first intentional communion program for younger students to teach them about the significance of the Eucharist. This program meets for a few weeks in the spring, culminating with recognition of the students at a Sunday service.



Adults

Christian Education has occurred in a variety of formats over the years; the more recent, successful programs have been led by the laity in a home environment. Clerical participation is welcomed! Six week "Soup and Study" Bible Studies held at Parishioners' homes have allowed participants to focus on certain sections of the Bible and how we live out scripture in our church and our individual lives.

A Spirituality and Contemporary Fiction Book Group meets once a month, also at a parishioner's home. Discussions do not follow a standard format, but are based on personal interests or questions of the assembled group to open doors of insight that may resonate with those present.

In addition, the church has hosted special speakers and lectures, which are publicized and open to the wider community.

Financial Summary

St. Stephen's Cohasset is in good financial condition and is meeting all of its current commitments. We are blessed to have a very talented group of parishioners who understand finance and are willing to help lead the parish. These individuals fill the roles of Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer, three members of the Trustees of the Endowments and a Finance Committee. The Treasurers oversee the creation and management of the yearly budget. The Trustees manage our two endowments, one unrestricted and one restricted. The Finance Committee has been working with the Rector, Vestry, Treasurers and Trustees to maintain a well thought out and cohesive plan.

In general, the church works very hard to produce a balanced budget year over year. Our pledges and plate cover approximately 75% of the budget, a sustainable draw from our two endowments another 17%, and other sources that vary from year to year contribute the remainder. We have budgeted 57% of our funds to personnel costs, 15% to mission (a combination of our Diocesan Assessment and our Parish Outreach), 12% to property operations, 7% to capital improvements and 9% to "other."

Although the foundation of our finances is sound, we are also blessed with a strong desire to do more, whether it be increased outreach or further care of our parish. This desire to do more has continually helped us to stretch and prioritize every dollar. We believe this is a healthy tension! At the same time, our worship community has been willing to step up when the appropriate need/opportunity presented itself (for example, a capital campaign to help address accessibility and another drive to reduce a mortgage).

As we look to our future, we acknowledge that we will always be stretched to do all that we want to do! At the same time, we give thanks for being able to make decisions from a stable position.



Diocese

St. Stephen's Parish is one of the 180 congregations in the Diocese of Massachusetts, which covers the nine counties of the Commonwealth east of Worcester County. Those counties include the most populous part of the State as well as Cape Cod and the islands of Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket. The rest of the Commonwealth lies within the Diocese of Western Massachusetts.

Our Diocesan Bishop, since 2014, has been the Rt. Rev. Alan M. Gates. He is assisted by the Rt. Rev. Gayle Harris, who has served as Suffragan Bishop since 2003.

The diocese is divided geographically into 12 deaneries. St. Stephen's is one of 16 congregations within the South Shore Deanery. Each congregation sends one clerical and two lay persons to meetings of the deanery and each deanery elects two members to the Diocesan Council. Apart from this elective function the deaneries serve as valuable sources of information and mutual support for the member congregations.

The diocese is largely supported by assessments on its constituent congregations based upon the size of their budgets. Each parish is entitled to send two lay delegates along with its rector and other clergy to the annual Diocesan Convention, whose unicameral assembly of clerical and lay delegates is the highest legislative authority within the Diocese.
