Gather a team for "Brave Conversations" Spring Learning Event

Year of Preaching series continues with "Naming Death, Claiming Hope" This year's diocesan Spring Learning Event—*Saturday, March 3,* 9 a.m.-4 p.m., at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston—will engage the need for "Brave Conversations" among people with different perspectives, passions and experiences. Congregations and worshiping communities are invited to gather a group and come together with others to acquire and share techniques and inspiration for establishing the church as a gracious place for dialogue on challenging topics and for expanding the possibilities for reconciliation and transformation.

All are welcome. Register online by Feb. 26 here.

Participants will have the opportunity to experience a gracious dialogue process focused on the topic of race; learn how to provide hospitality and prepare people for dialogue, not debate; learn about inviting people into initial dialogue to achieve mutual understanding through deep listening; and access curriculum resources for continued learning. The event aims to equip participants with new and expanded skills that they can use in their churches and communities.

The Kaleidoscope Institute will facilitate the day's program, adapted specifically for use in congregations and communities in the Diocese of Massachusetts.

Sessions will focus on recent trends and changes in American death rituals and funeral practices; an examination of the role of preaching at a funeral or memorial service; and using the Holy Week lectionary to explore preaching possibilities during the week commemorating Jesus' own death.

• Presiding Bishop Michael B. He invites Episcopalians "to deepen our participation in Christ's ministry of reconciliation by **dedicating offerings at observances of the Feast of Absalom Jones to support the two remaining Episcopal Historically Black Colleges and University (HBCUs)**: St. Augustine's University in Raleigh, N.C., and Voorhees College in Denmark, S.C." The two institutions of higher education were founded in the late 19th century as an Episcopal Church missionary venture. "These schools bring educational, economic and social opportunity to often resource-poor communities, and they offer many blessings into the life of the Episcopal Church," Curry said in his appeal.

	Voted to approve clergy housing allowances for 2018.
	Voted to increase the 2018 General Convention budget by \$10,000.
