"Mission Match" invites congregations to map their assets

As part of the diocesan mission strategy, subgroups formed in 2017 have been working on implementation recommendations for embracing brave change by reimagining our congregations, building our relationships and engaging our world.

One of these subgroups has been working to implement "Mission Match," a diocesan version of Episcopal Relief & Development's online asset mapping tool to connect people and congregations and the good work of their programs and ministries with the needs of communities in this diocese and beyond. The asset map can also serve a vital role in disaster preparedness and response.

In upcoming weeks, Mission Match working group member Hilary Greene of St. Mary's Church in Barnstable and diocesan staff member Martha Gardner, Missioner for Networking and Formation, will be contacting deanery leadership to set up meetings to present the Mission Match asset map and the features available to all. Their goal is to have every congregation update its profile so that the search capability for the Diocese of Massachusetts becomes more robust and truly helps build our relationships. • Beware of e-mail gift card scams: E-mail impersonation scams that involve gift card requests were prevalent over the past Christmas holiday season, and some dioceses, churches, clergy and other congregational leaders continue to be targeted.

A common tactic in these scams (also known as "phishing") is to send e-mails that appear to be from the recipient's employer or a leader of an organization that the recipient is affiliated with (or, in church contexts, the e-mails might appear to be from the rector or a bishop). The scam e-mails say that urgent help is needed and request that the recipient buy and electronically send gift cards from a specific company, commonly Amazon, iTunes or Google Play. These scam requests appear to come from a legitimate e-mail account of a known person. They usually convey a sense of urgency. They often incorporate a signature line that looks legitimate at quick glance.

What to do:

- Inform your congregation about these phishing scams and reinforce the message that clergy and church leaders will never ask for emergency aid or donations in this way.
- Be skeptical of unexpected e-mail requests to send or spend money.
- Read with caution any e-mail that asks for gift cards. Look for tell-tale typos and grammatical mistakes, and double-check sender e-mail addresses for authenticity.
