The Mission Initiatives Committee, a committee of the Diocesan Council, is accepting applications from congregations and diocesan-sponsored organizations for financial support through the annual diocesan budget. As a response to the call in the <u>diocesan mission strategy</u> to "assess the ways our current use of resources and governance structures support or impede the goals of our mission strategy and make appropriate changes," Bishop Alan M. Gates has charged the Committee on Constitution and Canons with undertaking a comprehensive review of the diocesan constitution and canons, with the goal of bringing a completed revision proposal to the 2020 Diocesan Convention for approval. The committee's intention is to consult widely before proposing any revisions, so it is starting its work this year to allow plenty of time and opportunity for input from people of the diocese.

The task includes identifying areas where changes to the constitution and canons would make them more accessible, responsive and relevant to diocesan life now and in the future, as well as a "clean-up" of discrepancies that have made their way into these vital governance documents over their many decades of use and revision.

Working closely with the bishops and the diocesan chancellor, committee members have been consulting with chancellors of other dioceses and have already met with the Standing Committee, Diocesan Council and diocesan staff to solicit initial input by April 1. They are available to meet over the next several months with deanery assemblies, clericus groups and other gatherings of people with an interest in the revision process. The committee plans to give a preliminary report on its work at the Diocesan Convention this November.
