Harris and a network of others engaged with ministry in Jerusalem and the Middle East for a special event, "Engaging Our Global Church: Palestinian Christians in Today's World," to be held on *Saturday, March 25, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.*, at the Church of Our Saviour (25 Monmouth Street) in Brookline. Special guests will be Wadie Far and Halim Shukair, both seminarians at Virginia Theological Seminary, who will share their experiences and perspectives. It will also be an occasion to learn more about the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and ministries in the diocese. All are welcome.

The mission pilgrimage will combine visits to holy sites, in Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Jordan Valley, Nazareth, Galilee, Nablus and Ramallah, with opportunities to learn about active mission in the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem through its school, health-care and peacemaking ministries.

The group will meet three times before the trip for orientation and community building. The sign-up deadline is April 30. Estimated cost is \$4,100 per person (double occupancy), with all payments due by Oct. 1.

ECF strategic planning intro offered April 29

Diocesan congregational development staff and the Episcopal Church Foundation hope to launch a pilot program that focuses on an alternative way of thinking about strategic planning. The idea is that as parishes plan strategically, they need to be flexible and have the ability to change course quickly in response to changing circumstances. The hope is to gather several parish teams who are looking to challenge their congregations. By working together with the consultant, it would reduce overall costs for the Episcopal Church Foundation's services and encourage congregations with similar sets of issues to support and learn from one another as they do their work.

DIOCESAN COUNCIL ACTIONS:

At its Feb. 23 meeting, the Diocesan Council:

Heard a report from the mission hub program director, Jin Min Lee, and voted to accept the Mission Hub Implementation Committee's recommendation of a three-tiered hub budget cut system to close a \$1.6-million funding gap: 70 percent of requested maximum for original requests of \$1 million; 75 percent of requested maximum for original requests of \$750,000; or 80 percent of requested maximum for original requests of less than \$750,000.

Heard a proposal from Bishop Alan M. Gates for an appeals process to the three-tiered budget cut system.

Heard a proposal from creation care advocates for funding green grants in 2017.

Heard a report from the Mission Strategy Implementation Organizing Team's co-chair Win Treese and an update about a proposed evaluation process for diocesan budget items.

Heard a report from the treasurer, Lisa Garcia, which included an update from the Assessment Formula Review Committee, preliminary financial results for 2016 and a summary of parishes that are in arrears on their 2016 assessments.

Voted to instruct the Assessment Formula Review Committee to construct proposals for new assessment formulas for 2018 which will result in a 10 percent net decrease in aggregate assessments received, to be reviewed at the March and April Diocesan Council meetings.
