#MeToo Task Force offers new resources for response to sexual misconduct In January, Bishop Alan M. Gates and Bishop Gayle E. Harris wrote a <u>pastoral letter</u> to the people of the diocese regarding sexual misconduct in the church. In it, they noted General Convention's three-year suspension of the statute of limitations on initiating clergy disciplinary cases.

They also recognized that sexual misconduct in the church is committed by clergy and lay persons alike, and they reported that the diocesan #MeToo Task Force was in the process of considering additional ways to respond.

To support healing and create a more respectful and honest culture in congregations and the diocese, the #MeToo Task Force has now created an online storytelling tool, available at <u>www.diomass.org/MeToo</u>, through which accounts of sexual misconduct in the church may be shared. Those using the form can remain anonymous if they choose. They can tell as much or as little as they wish. They can choose whether or not they'd like to be contacted for pastoral support. They can also choose to make a formal report.

The #MeToo Task Force also has prepared a poster detailing the means for relating and reporting accounts of sexual misconduct in the church. Laminated copies of these posters have been mailed to all congregations for display in bathrooms, parish halls and offices. The new resource materials will be available soon in Spanish.

The Episcopal Church has a canonical process for handling allegations of misconduct by active or retired clergy; in those cases, diocesan intake officers are in place to receive formal complaints, which, if material and substantial, lead to a disciplinary process. • The Episcopal Church's Task Force on Church Planting and Congregational Redevelopment has announced that its first set of **grants for new Episcopal communities** is now available for Episcopal dioceses and mission developers who are envisioning, planning or growing new worshiping communities and missional enterprises throughout the church. The grants are part of a \$2.5-million initiative funded by the 2018 General Convention that seeks to celebrate and strategically support emerging Episcopal Church communities and that builds partnerships within and beyond the church, expands the church's language of ministry and creates new ways for the church to engage the people of God.

Four categories of grants are available. *Monday, July 15* is the deadline for the first round of grant applications; after that, applications will be accepted on a rolling basis through the end of the current ministry triennium in 2021.

• Nominations to serve as a member of the church's Executive Council are now being accepted through *Wednesday, July 31* to fill a vacancy whose term concludes at General Convention 2021; only priests and deacons are eligible to fill this vacancy. Nominations should be submitted online <u>here</u> (English) or <u>here</u> (Español).

Candidates must be able to attend upcoming Executive Council meetings: In 2020, Feb. 13-15; June 8-11; and Oct. 9-12; and in 2021, Jan. 22-25; and April 14-17. More information is available <u>here</u>. The Episcopal Church's Executive Council is an elected body that oversees the execution of the program and policies adopted by the General Convention.

• All Our Children, the national network devoted to public education advocacy and school-church partnerships, is in the process of ending its operations and programming, and is making its remaining financial assets available through **a small grant program**. **School-church partnerships or public education advocacy programs affiliated with the Episcopal Church** are invited to apply by *Thursday, Aug. 1*. At its June 20 meeting, the Diocesan Council:

Heard an update from the Mission Strategy Committee about its current goals.

Heard a presentation from the 20s and 30s Task Force about its current information-gathering work and the online survey that is open until July 15 (<u>here</u>) as a means of hearing from as many people in their 20s and 30s as possible.

Heard a report from the Mission Initiatives Committee about site visits to the MANNA community and the B-SAFE and B-PEACE programs.

Voted to include in the proposed budget for 2020 the following Mission Initiatives grants: \$12,900 for ProGente, Framingham; \$12,900 for KIC (Kids in Community), Lynn; \$12,900 for St. Andrew's Church in New Bedford; and \$5,200 for St. Peter's Church in Waltham.
