Join "Way of the Cross" video prayer walk to end gun violence in Mass.	Episcopalians statewide are invited to "walk" the Way of the Cross together this Holy Week, by visiting 14 church and ministry sites from Falmouth to Great Barrington via a video project that draws on the ancient practice of pilgrimage to bring attention to the current-day scourge of gun violence. "The Way of the Cross: Ending Gun Violence in Massachusetts" will premiere on Palm Sunday, April 10 at 7 p.m. on the YouTube channels of both the Diocese of Western Massachusetts and the Diocese of Massachusetts, and then be available thereafter for devotional use by individuals and groups, at home or church. This is a project of the expanding B-PEACE network of both dioceses.
Listening sessions on reparations scheduled throughout May	The 2021 Diocesan Convention resolution " <u>Charting the Long Road</u> <u>Towards Reparations</u> " calls on the diocese to commit 2022 as a year of study, gathering and sharing stories and discernment. To futher this process, the Reparations Subcommittee of the Racial Justice Commission is organizing a series of regional "Repara- tions Listening Gatherings" now scheduled during May via Zoom. These gatherings will be designed to create space for listening to all throughout the diocese as they share their thoughts and feelings regarding reparations. The deadline for submitting all materials will be *Friday*, *Sept. 2.* This will be the final day to submit materials to the Convention Office, including nomination forms for elected positions, resolution submission forms and written reports.
