Save Oct. 6 for celebration of Bishop Alan Gates & Tricia Harvey

The bishops have called upon the congregations of the diocese to commemorate the 50th anniversary of women's ordination in The Episcopal Church this July. "It was a singular moment of transformation in our life together in the Body of Christ," they write.

A new litany composed by Bishop Carol Gallagher for the occasion is available, as well as other resources for individual and congregational observance and learning. Read more here.

The Office of the Presiding Bishop notified the wider church on June 27 that the election of the Rev. Julia E. Whitworth as the diocese's next bishop had received the required majority of consents from diocesan standing committees and bishops exercising jurisdiction in The Episcopal Church. Preparations are now underway for Bishop-elect Whitworth's ordination and consecration service, to take place on Saturday, Oct. 19 at 11 a.m. at Trinity Church in Boston. She will be seated as the 17th bishop diocesan of the Diocese of Massachusetts the following day, Sunday, Oct. 20 at 5 p.m. at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston.

More details about the consecration service—including seating, livestreaming and regional watch parties—will be announced as the date approaches. Meanwhile, volunteers will be needed throughout the consecration weekend, ranging from choir members, acolytes, crucifers, liturgical ministers, procession marshals, greeters, ushers, hospitality and watch party hosts and more. Anyone who is interested is invited to sign up to be considered for available roles. The online volunteer sign-up form is available at www.diomass.org/ consecration. All are invited to come together in celebration and gratitude for Bishop Alan Gates and Tricia Harvey and 10 years of episcopal ministry, as Bishop Gates prepares to retire this fall.

A family-friendly celebration and reception is being planned for Sunday, Oct. 6, 12-4 p.m., at the New England Aquarium in Boston. Everyone in the diocesan community is welcome to come for all or part of the afternoon, with aquarium admission included.

• "Why Pray?": The St. Paul Center for Theology and Prayer each summer hosts an in-person day to tackle a "big question" and this year asks: "Why Pray?" All are invited and welcome to explore this important question together. The day will include teaching, conversation, reflection and, of course, prayer. All participants will leave with materials to bring back to their congregation, to continue the conversation and learning.

- The 2024 edition of "Season of Creation: A Celebration Guide for Episcopal Parishes" is now available. Created in 2022 and first published for the dioceses of Western Massachusetts and Massachusetts, the liturgical guide has expanded this year to include a new Daily Office guide for lay-led services and expanded and diversified readings, among other additions and improvements. As of June 20, the guide had been authorized for use in 42 dioceses—including Massachusetts—during this year's Season of Creation, Sept. 1-Oct. 4. - This year's stewardship campaign theme from TENS (The Episcopal Network for Stewardship) is "Walk in Love / Anden en amor." The diocesan membership allows congregations free access to TENS stewardship campaign materials, including reflections, a timeline for campaign implementation, artwork, pledge cards and more. - New guidance and requirements for memorial gardens and columbaria: Last year, the Diocese of Massachusetts concluded nearly seven years of costly and painful litigation regarding the relocation of cremated remains from the memorial garden of a former Episcopal church property. While the diocese prevailed in the liti-

gation, the opinion rendered by the Supreme Judicial Court hinged on appropriate documentation between the church and purchasers of burial plots. In response to this experience, the diocesan chancellor, Ned Notis-McConarty, and Canon to the Ordinary Bill Parnell have put forward guidance and requirements for churches with memorial gardens, columbaria or any other place for interment of cremated remains, along with a template for purchase agreements. These documents have been endorsed by the Standing Committee and its Real Estate Advisory Committee and are posted on the diocesan website here.

The guidelines **require** that any church with an existing memorial garden or columbarium submit its governing documents for review to ensure that appropriate language is included which makes clear the terms of purchase, thus protecting the rights of the church and purchasers of burial plots. These documents are to be submitted to the canon to the ordinary at bparnell@diomass.org for review. Any recommendations for alteration of the documents will be provided after consultation with the chancellor.

Churches which are planning to establish a new memorial garden or columbarium are **required** to submit their proposal to the Real Estate Advisory Committee for review and approval by the Standing Committee.

The template for a purchase agreement may be adapted for local use, provided critical language (in bold in the document) is included.

GRANTS & LOANS:

- The Mission Strategy Committee of Diocesan Council encourages congregations, organizations and networks in the Diocese of Massachusetts to apply for **Wicked Good Idea Microgrants** of up to \$2,500 to take on a ministry idea in their mission settings. - The Church Home Society has launched a three-year pilot grant program, allocating up to \$40,000 a year to support **youth ministries in Episcopal churches**. Grant awards will be between \$1,000 and \$2,000. Applications (form available here) are due the last day of the month, August 2024 through April 2025, and they will be reviewed at the following monthly board meeting.
