# Consecration celebration invites everyone's prayer and participation

Preparations are nearing completion for a joyous celebration in the Diocese of Massachusetts of the ordination and consecration of Bishop-elect Julia E. Whitworth, to take place on *Saturday*, *Oct. 19 at 11 a.m.* at Trinity Church in Boston. Everyone's prayers and participation are invited!

**General seating:** Since seating at the consecration service will be available as capacity allows, advance registration is necessary. Doors open at 9:30 a.m., with the liturgical procession beginning at 10:30 a.m. A reception will follow the 11 a.m. service.

**Join a watch party:** The service will be livestreamed, and for those who would like to watch together with others, regional watch parties are being hosted by seven church sites around the diocese, with St. David's Church in South Yarmouth newly added to the list. Watch parties open at 10 a.m. at all locations. Registration is not required, but will be appreciated as site hosts plan for seating and hospitality.

**Evensong with seating of the new bishop:** The celebration continues on *Sunday, Oct. 20 at 5 p.m.*, when the new bishop is seated at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston during a service of Evensong. All are welcome; RSVP is requested.

Healthy Congregations Task Force launches "Landscape Assessment" The Healthy Congregations Task Force—formed in response to the 2023 Diocesan Convention resolution calling for such—has partnered with Holy Cow! Consulting to launch a "Landscape Assessment" to "provide valuable information concerning how we are living into our mission and vision as a diocesan community, where we shine, where we'd like to focus our energy and where we can, in collective ministry, find new ways to lift each other up."

The task force asks everyone—clergy and lay people, including diocesan staff—to fill out the assessment which is available in English and Spanish. Clergy are encouraged to share this information with their congregations and worshiping communities. The assessment will take about 15 minutes to complete and must be done at one time. Confidentiality is central to this work; all responses are anonymous and go directly to Holy Cow! Consulting.

### Reparations Fund Committee membership announced

Members of the inaugural Reparations Fund Committee have been appointed by Bishop Alan Gates and confirmed by the Diocesan Council at its meeting on Sept. 14.

The committee's creation was authorized by the annual Diocesan Convention in 2023. The Reparations Fund that the committee will administer was created by the convention in 2022 after two years of study and preparation. The committee's role will be to carry out the convention's stated mission for the fund, "to help repair the breach of systemic racism in the life of our diocese, region and nation, by resourcing Black communities to flourish in myriad ways." The committee will discern, oversee, direct and report on all reparations payments, disbursements and investments, in furtherance of the fund's mission.

Constance Perry of Trinity Church in Boston and the Rev. Nathan Ives of St. Peter's-San Pedro Church in Salem will serve as committee co-chairs, with committee members:

Bishop Alan Gates and Bishop Carol Gallagher reviewed applications and identified committee membership with the counsel of leaders and members of the Racial Justice Commission, including the Rev. Carol Morehead, the Rev. Will Mebane, the Rev. Chris Wendell, Louise Gant, the Rev. Edwin Johnson and the Rev. Canon Jean Baptiste Ntagengwa. Within the guidelines of the committee's organizing authorization, membership is made up of a majority of persons of color, predominantly lay persons, and members drawn from all three regions of the diocese.

The committee will begin its work in accordance with the Guiding Principles of the Fund as authorized by Diocesan Convention.

• In response to the devastation left in the wake of Hurricane Helene, **prayers for recovery, and donations to** Episcopal Relief & Development's Hurricane Relief Fund are invited. Episcopal Relief & Development said in a Sept. 30 web statement that it is in communication with partners in the region hit by the storm, including Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, South Carolina and North Carolina.

"This storm has caused widespread damage to a huge swath of the southern U.S.," said Katie Mears, Senior Technical Specialist, Disaster Risk and Resilience, for Episcopal Relief & Development. "For now, we ask for people who live outside of impacted areas to stay put—the impacted communities are not prepared for in-kind donations or volunteers from out of town at the moment."

#### • Consultants needed to shepherd parishes in transition:

Currently in the diocese there is a large number of congregations in the priest-in-charge process, and there is a need for consultants who can help guide these churches and priests on their path. Those who have served in lay or clergy leadership in congregations, have been a member of a search committee or have skills in discernment, development or human resources may be well-suited for this role. Training is available.

Ideally, consultants would commit to a congregation for three years, but some people may be drawn to the work for certain years or particular points in the discernment process. Roughly, the first year involves getting to know each other; the second year is envisioning the future for the congregation; and the third year is a discernment process to decide whether the priest-in-charge is the right candidate for rector and if the candidate discerns a calling to remain as rector.
