It's not too late: Healthy Congregations Task Force welcomes survey responses The "Landscape Assessment" launched by the Healthy Congregations Task Force is still open and accepting responses toward the aim of providing "valuable information concerning how we are living into our mission and vision as a diocesan community, where we shine, where we'd like to focus our energy and where we can, in collective ministry, find new ways to lift each other up."

The task force asks everyone to fill out the assessment which is available in English and Spanish. Clergy and congregational leaders are encouraged to share this information with their congregations and worshiping communities. The assessment takes about 15 minutes to complete. Confidentiality is central to this work; all responses are anonymous and go directly to Holy Cow! Consulting which is administering the survey. Ministry Discernment Conference to offer broader focus in 2025

The annual Ministry Discernment Conference has a new focus in 2025: **"How Is God Calling Me? A Day of Resources for Vocations of All Kinds."** It is for anyone discerning God's call in their life. Everyone who is interested in discerning calls to ministry in the church and in the world, both lay and ordained, is warmly invited to gather at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston for the 2025 Ministry Discernment Conference on *Saturday*, *Feb. 1*, 9 a.m.-3 p.m.

This gathering, jointly hosted by the Commission on Ministry and the St. Paul Center for Theology and Prayer, will feature Bishop Julia Whitworth's reflections on discernment, a panel discussion with people serving in a variety of Christian vocations and an introduction to resources for individual reflection, communal discernment in congregations and churchwide discernment programs. After lunch, participants will be invited, in smaller groups, to learn more about the programs that most interest them.

People who want to learn about the ordination process in the Diocese of Massachusetts are especially encouraged to attend, along with their sponsoring clergy, potential parish discernment committee members and family members.

• Annual Enrollment continues until Nov. 15. This is the period when eligible employees can make changes to their enrollment in medical and dental insurance without a qualifying event.

There are no changes to the plan offerings from 2024 to 2025. However, all enrolled members are encouraged to log in and confirm their choices for the coming year.

CPG is sending out e-mails to all enrolled members with information on how to make their choices for next year. The Explanations of Benefits & Coverage for the medical and dental plans are available on CPG's website. Additionally, a comparison chart for the available plans can be found here. The diocese's policies for congregations to provide health insurance to employees can be found in the Compensation and Benefits Guidelines here.
