Registration Now Open for Convention!

Check Out these Important Convention Dates and Details **Register Today for Convention,** to be held November 14-15 at Boston Marriott Burlington Hotel in Burlington, at <u>this link</u>. Early registration is encouraged. All information and materials related to Convention can be found on the <u>Convention website page</u>.

Submission Deadline for all Convention materials (other than nominations): 5 pm on Friday, September 5. No late submissions will be accepted after this deadline. This deadline applies to:

- Applications for admission as a parish or mission of the diocese.
- Reports from diocesan committees, task forces, or networks.
- Proposed resolutions.

Submission Deadline for Nominations and Supporting Materials: 5 pm on Monday, September 15. This deadline applies to:

- Nomination form (PDF), including 75-word descriptive statement, to be published in the handbook so members of Convention can know something about the nominees.
- A digital headshot photo, also to be published in the handbook.
- A one-minute or shorter video describing your interest in the position and the gifts you can bring to it.

An **open comment period** on proposed resolutions runs Sept.12-17, with a Zoom discussion scheduled for Tuesday Sept.16 at 7 p.m. (an online feedback form will also be available during the comment period). This is an opportunity to offer feedback and ask questions about proposed resolutions before they are distributed in final form for the Convention's consideration. Registration for this will open in mid-September; check the Convention website page for the link.

Pre-Convention Forums—open to all, particularly voting members of the convention—will be held via Zoom on: Saturday, October 18, 2-3:30 pm; Tuesday, October 21, 7-8:30 pm; Wednesday, October 22, 7-8:30 pm. These forums offer an important opportunity for discussion about the issues and business to come before the Convention, including the proposed 2026 diocesan budget, resolutions, and elections. Zoom links will be available in the fall; check the website for links.

Clergy desiring to vote at Convention must be **canonically resident** two weeks prior to its start; contact Margaret Lias at mlias@diomass.org to complete this process by Saturday, November 1.

Delegate changes should be reported via the delegate substitution form

until Friday, November 7; after that date, email convention@diomass.org to ensure the change is processed.

Resources for Season of Creation, September 1-October 4

"Peace with Creation" is the theme for the Season of Creation this year—September 1-October 4 — inviting us to consider our ecological, economic, and political ways of living. Metacomet's Rebellion/King Philip's War: A Story of its History and Legacy—A Seminar

Learn about colonial America's bloodiest conflict, a story many of us know very little about. Pokanoket Tribal Historian Don Strong Turtle Brown Jr. will introduce us to how skirmishes and clashes in culture from the Native peoples' earliest contacts with Europeans led eventually to Metacoment's Resistance, commonly known as King Philip's War. Indigenous Peoples' Day Sacred Journey to Deer Island

Date: October 13, 9 am-5 pm

Location: Natick, MA, to Deer Island

Join us for a sacred journey from St. Paul's, Natick to Deer Island—the internment site where hundreds of Native people from the "praying towns" died from exposure and starvation in the winter of 1675-1676. This spiritual experience of place, presence, and still reflection will be guided by Native neighbors, supported by Episcopal communities, and include the bishops of both the Diocese of Massachusetts and the Diocese of Western Massachusetts. We are encouraging youth to come with their families and congregations on this historic and important journey. There will be an opportunity for young people to gather while we are there and debrief what this has meant to them and what they have learned. Registration is required by Friday, October 3.

This resource, <u>Preparation for Deer Island Journey</u>, offers details on what to expect from the sacred journey as well as more information on early contact between Native peoples and English colonists and the clashes leading up to Metacomet's Resistance/King Philip's War—important history to know whether or not you plan to attend the journey October 13.

How does that work, and how might our own prayer, in church and in our day-to-day lives, join, facilitate, and aid the rest of Creation's worship? Diocesan Council Actions

At its August 21 meeting, the Diocesan Council:

- Heard updates from Bishop Whitworth and Canon Chris Wendell on the visioning process and next steps.
- Heard updates from Bishop Whitworth on staffing changes.

- Heard an update from the chair of the Compensation and Benefits Committee.
- Passed the following motion presented by the Diocesan Loan Committee: The Diocesan Loan Committee moves that the interest rate for new Diocesan Loans granted through either the Stokes Fund or Cederholm Green Loan programs issued after October 1, 2025, be changed to 3.00% from the current 1.50%.
- Reviewed a draft of the 2026 diocesan budget as presented by the Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer.
- Heard an update from the Secretary on the planning for Annual Convention.
